Spare a thought for the directors of non-professional theatre companies, and for conductors for that matter who might have long planned a rehearsal last week or this past weekend only to find that it coincided with the semi-finals and then the final of the UEFA Cup. I would like to think, that all the people who were absent from that rehearsal were out casting their votes, but who knows? It so happens that a reissue of Rimsky-Korsakov's *Scheherazade* coupled with a suite of movements from Smetana's *The Bartered Bride* has been reissued on the Vox label. This audiophile recording by the St Louis Symphony Orchestra conducted by Jerzy Semkow in the


former work, and Walter Susskind in the Cech suite. Recorded back in 1975 and 1976, the remastering is truly remarkable with a clarity that emphasises the legendary work of the original recording team (Vox -NX-3043CD).
